Milestones

City of Gulf Breeze



Police Station



- No local tax dollars spent
- 90% federal Rescue Plan dollars
- Infill redevelopment project
- Total \$4.7M
- On time and on budget

- State-of-the-art Emergency Operations and Dispatch Center
- Prior building was built in 1985 when the city had 12 full-time officers
- New police station is 7,787 sq. feet
- Project included the demo of the Old 1950s firehouse, a goal in city plans since 2007





Operational Audit

Bi-annually, the City's Police Department voluntarily participates in an operational audit by law enforcement officers representing agencies statewide with the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation.



Accreditation

Accreditation is the certification by an independent reviewing authority that an entity has met specific requirements and prescribed standards. The city's law enforcement has consistently attained the highest rating.

City Services Annex



- Zero cost to ratepayers for the new utility offices in a city services annex.
- Older plans called for a new, larger City Hall to make space. 2012 Most Livable City Master Plan proposed developing conservation land in Shoreline Park South or commercial property on Highway 98.
- City Hall consists of 2 to 4 employees per office.
- No meeting space for developer plan reviews, conferences, or Human Resources privacy.
- Relocating Utility Customer Service to a City Annex allows for space re-use with no bigger footprint.
- More secure with added amenities including a walk-up outside window.











- Re-constituted a Fire Board with new appointees after a decade of nonactivity.
- Transitioned from 100% Volunteer Fire Rescue Department to a Combination Dept.
- Fire Station upgrades thanks to community sponsors.



- Appointed the city's first salaried Fire Chief and Fire Marshall.
- Most Fire Departments in this country are volunteer or mostly volunteer.
- 45% of Fire Departments in the state of Florida are volunteer.

STATE OF THE CITY | JANUARY 2024

The city has consistently upheld a minimum of 6 months' worth of operating reserves, serving as a contingency fund.

Exactly the Florida benchmark, 6.79% of the City's total expenses is allocated to debt.

NOTABLE HIGHLIGHTS



PAVING

- Schedule is a minimum 2 miles per year for 15 yrs.
- Daniel Circle redesign as a boulevard for safety between GBHS softball field, hotel, and shopping outparcels.
- Sidewalk and bike lane repairs on Highway 98.



MULTI-MOBILITY

- \$3.25M allocated by legislature for the multimodal overpass on Highway 98.
- Additional \$2.35M appropriation request for 2024 with construction scheduled Dec '24.
- Corridor safety improvements:
 TPO ranked project to widen sidewalk to a new 12' wide shared use path from new overpass to Pensacola Beach Road



WATER & RECLAIM

- Resolution No. 17-2023; A 20-year renewal for the supply of water among Gulf Breeze, Holley-Navarre Water System, Inc., and Midway Water System, as owners of the Fairpoint Regional Utility System, Inc.
- South Santa Rosa Reuse Initiative Phase III; \$2.5M in grant funds to construct 4.3 miles of pipe to join the Holley-Navarre Water System (HNWS) wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) with the City of Gulf Breeze reuse system. The transmission line will include connections every 1,500 feet for future customers.



Phase 1: Highway 98 Corridor

Funded by CRA dollars that are 80/20 county/city ad valorem. Contractor boring complete by March '24. FPL and other utilities will pull their lines through the conduit and then the utility poles will be removed by FPL and AT&T. Project complete by summer 2024.

Phase 2: Neighborhood Collectors

Funded by the city's infrastructure fund and a blend of franchise fee, fuel tax and ½ cent sales tax. Fairpoint, Shoreline, Sunset S, and Daniel. Design '24. Construction '25.

Phase 3: Neighborhoods


68% of city neighborhoods' utilities are not underground. Once the collector roadways are complete, the City Council will consider a phased funding plan neighborhood by neighborhood.

City Wide Septic to Sewer

8-year \$15 million plan




- 43% of city households are on septic. Initiative made possible by 2023 consolidation of the two water & sewer enterprises into the new Gulf Breeze Regional Water System. This allows for regional cost-sharing. Funding is from utility revenues and grants.
- 2023, design completed for 3 of 7 major areas. Bids are ready for the areas of Highpoint, Florida, Montrose and Navy Cove. Bay Cliffs at 60% design.
- The city has unofficially received notice of additional grant awards in '24.



Stormwater Master Plan Completion

Shoreline Park and West Basin Stormwater Projects complete the 2014 Stormwater Master Plan.



- Shoreline Park Drainage Project. Cost: \$1.1 Million; 100% grant funded. Design complete 2023—construction '25.
- West Basin (Comprised of 3 separate projects) Eufaula Outfall Project. Cost: \$800,000 with \$375,000 grant-funded.
- Gilmore to Shoreline Project. Cost: \$4 million with zero grant funds. The project installs a secondary pipe across Shoreline for GRAVITY outfall.



Navy Cove/Montrose Project. Cost: \$1.2 million. 50% RESTORE grant. Provides stormwater collection around Fairpoint, Montrose, and Berry Drive and provides stormwater treatment. Design expected in 2024. Final approval awaiting the Treasury Dept.

WAYSIDE PARK

\$2.2M Hurricane Recovery Plan



- We completed the design for Wayside Park improvements and repairs for the Jan 2024 bid.
- 5-year repayment plan from bed tax dollars with no interest.
- Accepted a new public art piece, The Mariner.



- Design for waterfront Promenade underway.
- Promenade construction 2024.



VISTA PARK AND PIER

\$600,000 Hurricane Recovery Plan Phase II



- Replacements of the seawall cap, sidewalk, and guardrail.
- 2023 Cost-share agreement between the City's Community Redevelopment Agency and Escambia County for the project.
- December 5th broke ground. Project underway.



- Phase III beautification plans for landscaping and parking improvements to bid for construction in 2024. Design complete.
- Prior to Phase 1 was FEMA rebuilding of the fishing pier.
