COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AREA HISTORY

In an effort by the City to create a sustainable downtown community and to address high vacancy rates in retail and office units along US 98 (Gulf Breeze Parkway), the City of Gulf Breeze proposed the delineation of a redevelopment area along the US 98 corridor, which serves as the City's economic and, to some extent, social core. To administer the activities and programs offered within the redevelopment area the City created a Community Redevelopment Agency in December of 1989.

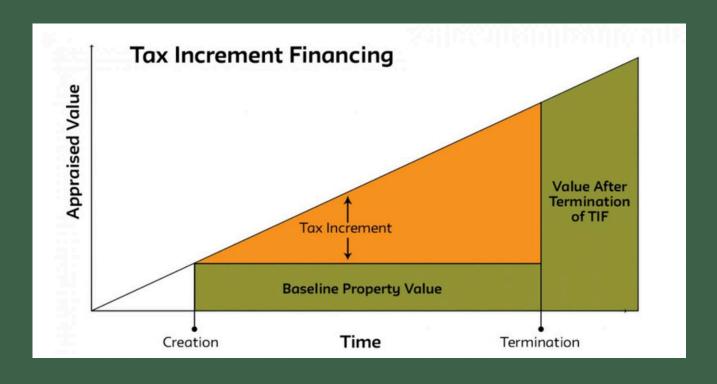
The current 2018 CRA plan builds on the Most Livable City Plan and the associated Comprehensive Plan updates adopted in 2014. Recommended redevelopment strategies and critical tasks included in the plan will enable the City of Gulf Breeze to stimulate and encourage economic development, provide increased public amenities, improve pedestrian safety and effectively manage redevelopment within the CRA in order to realize the City's vision and long-term community goals as described in the Most Livable City Plan

First and foremost, I am delighted to announce that the underground utility project has officially broken ground. All conduit is now in the ground, and sidewalk restoration has been completed. The installation of FPL decorative lights has added a beautiful touch to our streets, and we anticipate that the remaining providers will soon pull their lines and remove old infrastructure in the coming months. This project marks a significant step forward in enhancing the infrastructure and aesthetics of our community.

Additionally, the CRA has commenced design work for the restoration and improvement of Wayside Park. Plans include a new boardwalk, pier, boat ramp, sunset promenade, landscaping, and shade structures. These enhancements will create a more enjoyable and accessible waterfront area for all residents to enjoy.

I am also pleased to announce the completion of the First Watch and Chipotle infill development project. This project not only adds new dining options to our community but also contributes to the vibrancy and economic growth of our city.

Furthermore, the City and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) have made significant progress on the design of the Highway 98 overpass, reaching 90% completion. With the help of a state appropriation, funding has been secured, and we anticipate a project start in December 2024. This overpass will improve traffic flow and safety, further enhancing connectivity within our city.

On another note, the CRA has finalized the Daniel Circle Streetscape plans and looks forward to breaking ground in the coming months. These streetscape improvements will create a more pedestrian-friendly environment and enhance the overall aesthetics of our city streets.

The CRA remains committed to safety and resilience through its support of police initiatives. We understand the importance of maintaining a secure environment for our residents and will continue to work closely with law enforcement to ensure our community's well-being. As we move forward, I am excited about the positive impact these projects will have on our city and its residents. Highway 98 Underground Utility Project -\$3,386,795

The CRA has begun the long-pursued initiative of undergrounding utilities on Highway 98. A contractor has been selected and work is underway. *27

Agreement for First Watch and Chipotle - \$500,000

The CRA supported a development agreement with SL&D for the removal of a vacant derelict building and the construction of two new fast-casual restaurants - First Watch & Chipotle. *34

Debt Service \$632,682

The CRA acquired a loan in the amount of \$10.7M to complete the Underground Utility & Multi-Modal Overpass Projects. *27

Police Initiative - \$326,395

CRA continued support enforcement within the CRA boundary. Specific initiatives included funding for increased law enforcement to implement community policing initiatives such as, Click it or Ticket, intensified motorized patrols, enforcement, traffic control and enforcement, narcotics intervention, foot commercial patrols the district, pedestrian safety and property crimes education campaigns. *29

The CRA continued to provide funding for the the natural resources department to provide landscape maintenance for the Highway 98 and SR 399 corridors including mowing, weeding, mulching, irrigation, tree trimming, plant management and sod treatment *25

The CRA funded the replacement of the shade gazebo structures inside Wayside Park that were damaged by Hurricane Sally. *25

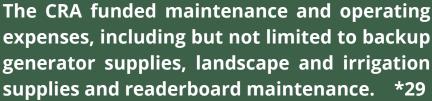

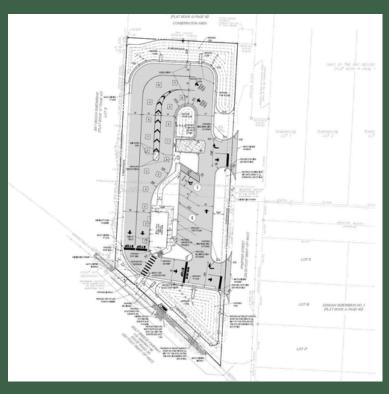

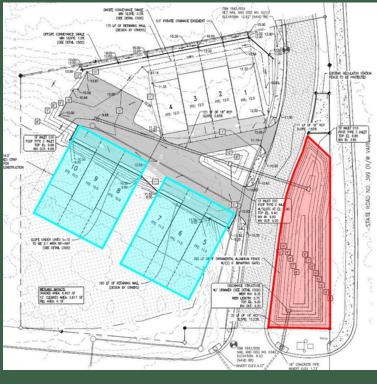
Redevelopment Project Scooters \$684,000 Cost of Construction
