

Mayor Fitch was elected to the City Council in 2012 and was re-elected to her 2nd term as Mayor in 2022. She also serves the Pensacola and Perdido Bays Estuary Program Policy & Finance Boards, FL-AL Transportation and Planning Organization, Emerald Coast Regional Planning Council, and the Florida League of Mayors.



Mayor Pro Tem Naile was elected to the City Council in December 2016. He also serves on the Gulf Breeze Regional Water System Board of Directors and the Fairpoint Regional Utility Board of Directors and presides as Mayor in the absence of Mayor Fitch.



Councilman Hebert was elected to the City Council in 2018 and was re-elected to his 2nd term in November 2022. He serves as the Ex-Officio Council appointee to the Gulf Breeze Are Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and completed the Institute for Elected Municipal Officials Program in 2019.



Councilman Torgersen was elected to the City Council in 2018 and was re-elected to his 2nd term in November 2022. He serves as the Council appointee to the Santa Rosa County Tourist Development Council and completed the Institute for Elected Municipal Officials Program in 2019.



Councilman Schluter was appointed to the City Council in 2019 to fill an unexpired term. He previously served on the Council from 2006 to 2014, as well as the Development Review Board, Bay Area Resource Council, Advisory Park Board, and Gulf Breeze Sports Association.



Starting October 1, 2021, thru 2023, Gulf Breeze Mayor Cherry Fitch and City Council secured a historic number of non-emergency related appropriations and grants totaling approximately \$21,108,333. 


SUPERVISOR OF THE YEAR



Shoreline Field Visitor Seating & Netting Installation



New visitor seating is coming to Shoreline Field this Fall, thanks to the Tourist Development Fund. The project will improve safety and crowd controls by separating the home team fans from visitors. Other amenities include an ADA Observation Area and an ADA Concrete Ramp for maximum accessibility with guard railings for safety.

City Septic-to-Sewer Conversion

The Gulf Breeze City Council funded a citywide program to convert properties that use septic tanks to a centralized collection and treatment system. The conversion of an estimated 1029 properties is estimated to cost over \$23 million. The goal is to primarily fund the conversions with grant funds and \$6 million in cash match. The conversion plan will be implemented over an eight-year time frame, with completion expected in 2029, providing 100% centralized sewer service within the City of Gulf

Police Station & City Services Annex

The new Police Station and City Services Annex is 90% grant funded. The new building is located on Fairpoint Drive at the Public Safety Campus with the Gulf Breeze Fire Station.

The new Police Station will include space for dispatch and a City Services Annex for Utility Billing and Customer Service Operations, located in a primary location for customers.

The new Police Station and City Service Annex is slated for completion in late Fall 2023. A full ceremony and tour will follow the completion of the project.



Police Department FY2023 Accomplishments

DONUT STRIKE FOR MANNA: The Gulf Breeze Police Department participated in the annual Donut Strike for Manna Food Bank event, which was a huge success. Eight agencies from Escambia and Santa Rosa counties came together to raise funds and collect food for neighbors in need. They were able to gather a total of 30,750 healthy meals, which provided much-needed sustenance to those in need. First Responders have been a consistent and remarkable contributor to this event since 2017, providing over 160,000 healthy meals to impoverished families and children.

M.A.D.D. NORTHWEST FLORIDA: M.A.D.D. of NW Florida recognized the agenicies top 4 officers in DUI arrests; Officer Sean Banks, Officer Brandon Scapin, Officer Joshua Erlemann, and Officer Robin Shaffer for keeping our streets safe by removing impaired drivers from the roads. Their efforts are greatly appreciated.

EXCELSIOR RECOGNITION: The Excelsior Recognition is the highest level of achievement in Florida accreditation a criminal justice agency can receive. Accreditation is the certification by an independent reviewing authority recognizing professional excellence. Being an accredited agency means the agency meets or exceeds the highest recommended levels of transparency, accountability, and professionalism.

ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING: The officers successfully completed the active shooter training, which involved a rigorous exercise designed to simulate real-life scenarios with an active shooter.





COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY (CRA)

The City established a Community Redevelopment Agency in December of 1989 to retail and office units along US 98 (Gulf Breeze Parkway). The agency's primary objective is to revitalize the area and make it a vibrant and thriving community for both residents and visitors. With this focused approach, the redevelopment area is set to become a hub of activity and a center of growth for the City of Gulf Breeze.

 Florida Redevelopment Agency – Attended the annual conference of the Florida Redevelopment Agency for resources and take-aways, including how CRA's can address homelessness and park safety.

Underground Utilities - Started construction for Sections A & B of the Hwy 98 Underground

Utility project.

- Highway 98 Multimodal Bridge Initiated the design of the Highway 98 Multimodal Bridge.
- Daniel Circle Streetscape -Completed the design for beautification and streetscape.
- CRA Police Initiative -Provided funding and enhanced enforcements such as school intersection safety during peak hours and community policing.
- Façade Improvement Grant Program Administered the Façade
 Improvement Grant program to support maintaining a quality image and consistent character in the CRA.
- Wayside Park Redevelopment Design Initiated the design for the redevelopment and repair of Wayside Park to enhance safety and aesthetics.
- Safe Streets Lighting Program and Critical Infrastructure Provided financial support for essential infrastructure, including pedestrian lights, traffic lights, generators, irrigation wells, and lift stations within the CRA.
- Landscape Maintenance Funded landscape maintenance within the CRA.
- First Watch and Chipotle Completed a vacant property redevelopment project for the construction of First Watch and Chipotle.

The Parks and Recreation Department provides a wide range of leisure activities and top-notch parks that improve the quality of life for our residents, neighbors, and visitors. The Parks Division is in charge of everything from daily maintenance to long-term planning, ensuring that our parks remain beautiful and enjoyable for years to come.

- Resurfaced floors in Gym A & Gym B.
- Hosted Summer Day Camp for 329 children and a free middle school program for 245 teens.
- Installed a new camera system for the Community Center.
- Purchased and installed a reader board sign on Shoreline Drive in partnership with GBSA.

POCKET PARKS

- Refurbished and repaired Bay Cliffs Boardwalk using excess materials from the Wetlands Trail Boardwalk.
- Partnered with 2 garden clubs for Arbor Day to plant new hardwood trees at Williamsburg and Shoreline Kids Park.

- Hosted the Annual Springfest with over 2,500 particpants.
- Hosted 6 Baseball Tournaments with over 50 participating teams.
- Hosted the 2022 Innisfree Basketball Tournament with over 60 out-of-town high school teams.





NATURAL RESOURCES

The Natural Resources Division is responsible for managing the City's natural resources, including tree protection and monitoring water quality. They also maintain the Public Stormwater System, which includes streets, sidewalks, rights-of-way, and the waste transfer station. In case of a natural disaster, this team follows the City's Emergency Operations Plan for preparedness and response.

- Enhance the technological components of the gas distribution system, such as GIS/Mapping, pressure, and flow monitoring.

- Update Digital Chart Recorders to SCADA Systems for monitoring live pressures and recording of the system.



DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

In 2019, Mayor Fitch and the City Council established the Development Services Division under the Public Works Department.

The Development Services Division provides expertise and assistance to all City departments in implementing the City's Capital Improvement Plan and annual special projects as directed by the Mayor and Council, as well as turnkey design and management for outsourced contractor projects.

The Division has been instrumental in ensuring the City receives optimal returns on its investments. By providing in-house project engineering, monitoring, drafting, and mapping, the number of projects outsourced to private professional service firms has been significantly reduced, resulting in substantial savings for taxpayers. Since its implementation, Development Services has successfully saved the City approximately \$200,000 annually. Furthermore, they've successfully identified and resolved conflicts between various projects, leading to even more cost savings. Our efforts have been a resounding success, and we're excited to continue making strides.
